**MISSION STATEMENT:** 

To proclaim the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ through witness, mercy, and Christian education Recently, a member of the church asked me a question about one of the offertories we use in worship. It was a question that really inspired me to search out the history behind these offertories and especially the reasons why we use these particular offertories in our liturgy.

There are three main offertories that we use in our liturgy. The first is "What shall I render to the Lord" which we use on Sundays in Advent and Christmas and again during the Easter season and Pentecost. This offertory is made up of several verses: Psalm 116:12, 17, 13-14, and 19, which come from the Hallel psalms, Psalms 113-118. When we sing this offertory, we are singing with Jesus, because the Hallel psalms would have been sung by Him and the disciples on Maundy Thursday at the first communion celebration.

The second one we use is "Let the Vineyards Be Fruitful." This is what we use mainly during summertime, and it's based on Psalm 104:14-14, Isaiah 25:6 and 1 Cor. 5:7.

The third offertory we use is "Create in me." The words go like this:

Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me. Cast me not away from Thy presence, and take not Thy Holy Spirit from me. Restore unto me the joy of your salvation, and uphold me with Thy free spirit.

These verses are the words of Psalm 51:10-12. So why do we use these verses for the offertory? And why do we sing of God casting us from His presence when He has promised to be with us always?

The offertory is part of a larger section of the liturgy consisting of the offering, offertory, and prayers. In this part of the liturgy, we respond to the gift of God's Word in the scripture readings, creed, and sermon. We offer our gifts to God and the church in the money we bring for offerings, while also offering our hearts as we pray and praise God in the offertory, and as we collectively offer Him our prayers.

This particular offertory uses the words of David after he had sinned with Bathsheba. These are some of the most heart-wrenching words used in the Bible in an unparalleled admission of guilt. We know that David knew full well how the Spirit of the Lord departed from Saul after he rejected God, and it makes sense that he would be afraid of the same downfall. Paul too talks about being "disqualified" from the race (1 Corinthians 9:27), and Jesus himself talks about how branches that do not abide in Him are thrown away and burned (John 15:6).

It is important for us to realize that because of our sin God has every right and all the power needed to cast us from His presence and to take His Holy Spirit from us. This is part of who God is: God cannot tolerate sin in His presence, or, as the Bible literally says, in His face. He must turn away from sin: that is the nature of our perfect God.

And that is exactly what happened on Good Friday. God saw His Son Jesus taking on the sin of the world, and He had to turn away. He could not tolerate the sin of the world in His face, and so He cast Jesus from his presence, and took His Holy Spirit from Jesus. Jesus died that day, taking with Him the sins of the world to be atoned for, forever. And Jesus succeeded in His divine task, showing us that He had completed His mission by rising from the dead on the third day, that first Easter Sunday.

Because of Jesus' work, we now sing this offertory joyfully, in full knowledge and reverence to a God who should cast us from His presence, but who keeps us in Him because of faith in Jesus Christ.

Yes, I am an ordinary man...with extraordinary support. By some standards I accomplished much during my professional career, yet by most standards I was very ordinary, and I have no complaints as I was blessed bountifully. Compared to some folks I was very blessed as they struggled significantly in their career and personal lives; my struggles pale in comparison to folks that truly suffer. My extraordinary support and blessings came from God as I struggled with self-doubt, poor habits, poor behavior...ordinary life issues.

As some of you know, Hilda is my greatest human support; my life would have been lonely and a lot less enjoyable without her. Failure can be extremely uncomfortable, if not painful...yet as one much wiser than me said "why not benefit from the pain of failure by learning from it". I have been taught that wisdom is the application of knowledge and experience...human wisdom that is. The Bible teaches us that the extraordinary application of God's wisdom is the peace that surpasses all understanding (Philippians 4:7 And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus).

How about us ordinary folks share His extraordinary peace?

## **President's Post**

Bethlehem Lutheran family, this month's newsletter will focus on the season of Lent. There are some excellent resources available on the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod website (lcms.org). I found some links to Lutheran Hour Ministries (lhm.org) with a downloadable book called "MAN OF SORROWS, PEOPLE OF JOY". This has daily devotions that can be used by yourself, with your family, or can be shared with others. I've included one of the devotions as our Catechism for this month. I've also included the church financials to keep you informed of our shared responsibilities to help spread the Word here in the Carson City/Carson Valley area.

## Catechism / Bible Study-

At that hour Jesus said to the crowds, "Have you come out as against a robber, with swords and clubs to capture Me? Day after day I sat in the temple teaching, and you did not seize Me. But all this has taken place that the Scriptures of the prophets might be fulfilled." Then all the disciples left Him and fled. (Matthew 26:55-56)

Mob scenes are not places where you find a lot of logic. But here we see Jesus trying to get His arresters to think—just for a moment. Why? He knew He wasn't going to escape. No common sense would save Him now..

But thinking clearly just might save some of the people attacking Him. Oh, probably not in the moment—but Jesus' words might come back to them in the middle of some sleepless night. And they would wonder: "Why *did* we go out there armed to the teeth? Did my leaders lie to me?".

That tiny crack of doubt might let in some light. It might even, through the work of the Holy Spirit, let in repentance—and the dawning of faith in Jesus their Savior.

Most of us have been lied to before. Most of us know what it's like to fall into sin because we're confused or befuddled or because someone has stoked our emotions so high that our brains aren't working anymore. And then we can do terrible things.

But in Jesus, there is forgiveness for us, destroying the darkness and taking away our guilt. When we trust in the One who laid down His life for us, we are free—free to see the truth and to love the Lord who is Truth eternal.

WE PRAY: Lord, You are the Way, the Truth, and the Life. Be all those things for me, too. Amen.

#### **Reflection Questions**:

When do you do your best thinking? When do you do your worst? Why? When has the Lord led you to a new and better understanding of a situation in your life?

We're nearing the end of Lent, and Easter is very near. Please consider the incredible sacrifice our Lord and savior has made on our behalf. We're having our mid-week services and soup suppers during Lent. Please join us for the soup suppers and mid-week services.

Please continue to pray for our Church, our school, our members, our pastor, our teachers, and our confirmands, and our students!!

I hope and pray that all or church families and members are well and in the Word. We have so very much to be thankful for with an awesome God who cares for us. He provides for us, comforts us in time of need, and is ALWAYS with us.

#### BETHLEHEM CHURCH FINANCIALS: (Narrative/Comments)

#### MONTH:

January Offerings of \$19,210 were \$2,925 less than the budget. The <u>average</u> monthly need is \$22,767 (\$273,200/12 mos.) February Offerings were also \$684 less than last February. Giving Units at 60 decreased by 4 compared to January and were 2 less than last February.

Payroll & Benefits were \$1,365 under budget due to a change in health insurers that delayed billing pushing it into March.

Other Operating Expense was \$3,758 over the budget. Most of the overrun is due to Consecration Sunday expenses that were paid in February but budgeted to be paid in March i.e., a timing difference. Slightly higher church maintenance expenses also contributed to the overrun.

#### Y-T-D:

Offerings through February are \$5,806 under budget. However, they are still \$17,320 greater than last year.

Payroll & Benefits show as being on budget; However, the underrun in health benefits discussed above is temporarily pulling current expense down. Otherwise, this expense would be \$1,235 over budget. This is mainly due to an unbudgeted 3<sup>rd</sup> paycheck for the church secretary i.e., there are 27 pay periods in this fiscal year as opposed to the normal 26. This was noted in June's report. It also includes the church's unbudgeted portion of a disability payment made in October. These overruns were somewhat offset by the January Concordia Plan Services billing change from advanced billing to current billing that caused a permanent skipped payment for January.

Other Operating Expense is currently \$4,146 under budget. This is due to an unbudgeted repair for the church's front door entry/exit hardware in July of nearly \$5,000 more than offset by underruns in multiple expense line items, some of which may be timing issues.

#### NORMALIZATION:

Normalizing Cumulative Actual Income and Expense for certain prospective and/or retrospective amounts that tend to distort current Y-T-D Financial Income produces the following results: \$191,106 Offerings and Income, \$190,251 Expense resulting in \$855 Net Financial Income. The primary driver of this difference being liability insurance that is paid in June and the delayed health insurance billing discussed above.
