Dionysus Versus Jesus?

If you watched the Olympic Opening Ceremonies a few weeks ago, you may have noticed a blue man with yellow hair and a beard wearing not much more than some fruit-filled vines. He shows up to a large table surrounded by revelers on a platter filled with colorful produce and flowers. The character portrayed was the Greek god Dionysus, the god of wine, fertility, vegetation, and pleasure. In Gallo-Roman mythology, Dionysus had a daughter named Sequana. One myth describes her as being pursued by Neptune who coveted her for her beauty. To hide from him, she was turned into the Seine River, which flows through downtown Paris and was featured in the opening ceremony. Sequana was portrayed later in the show as the rider on the silver horse galloping on the Seine.

The myth of Dionysus has been around since the 8th century BC. The Greek poet Homer, famous for writing the Iliad and the Odyssey, also wrote several hymns about Dionysus. In addition, there was a popular, long-running play about Dionysus written by Euripides in the 5th century BC called *The Bacchae*. It tells of Dionysus' return to Greece in human form (more on that later). Other myths of that time described Dionysus as conquering India.

In the intertestamental times, after the Greeks gained power in Palestine, Pharaoh Ptolemy Philadelphus II changed the name of the Israelite city of Beth-shan to Scythopolis. Ptolemy II was a big fan of Dionysus, so he began the tradition of having a quadrennial parade in honor of the god, featuring a 12-foot-tall statue of Dionysus. In the mid-2nd century BC, the Seleucid King Antiochus IV forced Jews to wear garlands of ivy and march in this procession honoring Dionysus. This offense against the Jewish religion was one of the factors that sparked the Maccabean revolt that overthrew the Seleucids from power.

Scythopolos was home to a large temple where various Greek gods were worshiped. In modern times, archaeologists have uncovered a six-sided limestone altar there which is currently at the Israel Museum in Jerusalem. On it, a message is inscribed giving thanks to Dionysus, who is called the "Founding Lord" of the city. The six sides of the altar show the face of Dionysus; Silenus, a member of his entourage; Pan, the god of shepherds; poles topped with pinecones; a panpipe; and a shepherd's crook.

Dionysus was said be the first to bring the seeds of the grapevine back from Palestine to show the Greeks how to make wine. There are many different stories of him doing miraculous deeds like making streams of water flow with wine. He was said to have the power to turn anything into wine. In the parts of Palestine where the wine industry was a staple of the local economy (like Beth-shan), inhabitants venerated Dionysus, especially where Hellenic influence was strong.

St. John the Evangelist most likely wrote his gospel while living in the coastal city of Ephesus, in modern-day Turkey. Ephesus had a strong industry dedicated to winemaking,. The city was best known for having a large temple of Artemi, but it also was home to a very active following of Dionysus. A few decades before Jesus' birth, the Roman general Mark Antony entered the city dressed as Dionysus to much acclaim, with the Ephesians playing their pars by dressing up, carrying around ivy garlands and playing harps and flutes. 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In light of some of the rumors going around about the Jewish people and the creeping influence of Dionysian worship in winegrowing regions of Palestine and Ephesus, it makes sense that John's gospel was written at least in part with the pagan veneration of Dionysus in mind. Notable Roman historians of that century like Plutarch and Tacitus erroneously thought that the Jewish people had begun to worship Dionysus, noting that like the Greeks, Jewish priests also sang and played the flute and cymbals and wore ivy garlands. The Jewish harvest festival, *Sukkoth* (The Feast of Booths or Tabernacles), also seemed a lot like the festivals with its dual emphases on the gathering of grain and the collection of wine from the winepress. This might explain why John never says Jesus attended the Feast of Booths in John 7, but only that he went up to Jerusalem in private and then begins teaching in the temple. It makes sense that Jesus did not want to give the impression that He was a party animal like Dionysus, or offer the people another opportunity to try to make Him their king, or show up like Mark Antony's Dionysus cosplay when and where the Jews were already seeking to kill Him.

Scythopolis was less than 20 miles away from Cana, where Jesus performed his first miracle, turning water into wine. However, John offers some details to "one-up" the purported miracles of Dionysus. Unlike Dionysus, Jesus performs his wine-making miracles in the daytime with known witnesses. Jesus' wine is also noted to be of superior quality. Later, when Jesus says in John 15:1 "I am the true vine," there is the implication that there is a false vine. What or who might that be? In Jesus' day, the alternative would have been Dionysus, as grapevines were considered to be manifestations of his divinity. Sacrifices were made so Dionysus would bless the vines and bring forth much fruit.

Many of the stories we know about Dionysus are told in Euripides play *The Bacchae*, first performed in 405 BC but which remained popular even in Jesus' day centuries later. In the play, Dionysus' human mother died when she was pregnant, so his father, the god Zeus, comes down from above and whisks up the baby and implants Dionysus in his thigh until he had grown enough to be born again. Another version of the story says that a young Dionysus was torn apart by the Titans, and only his heart survived, which Zeus takes to heaven with him and regrows until he is ready to be born from above. So when Jesus tells Nicodemus in John 3 that in order to be a part of the kingdom of God, one must be born again/born from above, this would be understood as another way of showing Hellenized Jews how Jesus is superior to Dionysus.

In the play, Dionysus returns to his home city of Thebes disguised as a human leader of a cult venerating him. However, Dionysus is rejected. Nobody believes he is really a god, despite performing a number of miracles. He is persecuted and arrested, but, to make a long story short, Dionysus places the King under a spell, and leads him into the woods where his mother, also under a spell, thinks he is lion and tears the king apart with her bare hands, and that is how Dionysus gets his revenge.

Euripides also talks about Dionysus' "bringing the counterpart to bread, wine... His blood, the blood of the grape, lightens the burden of our mortal misery... Though himself a god, it is his blood we pour out to offer thanks to the gods, and through him we are blessed." The similarities to the Lord's Supper are hard to ignore, but yet again, Jesus one-ups Dionysus because in Holy Communion, we receive not just the blood of our God, but also His flesh as true food, the bread of life.

In the 3rd century AD, the church father Origin writes a major apologetics work called "Against Celsus." Among the problems Celsus has with Christianity is how Jesus doesn't live up the Greco-Roman values espoused in *The Bacchae*. But Origin points out that the contrasts between the play and Jesus' life show exactly how Jesus is superior to Dionysus. (Continued on Page 3)

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In the play, Dionysus killed his enemies. In real life, Jesus died for sinners.

In Greek mythology, Dionysus' body is torn apart by the Titans, so when he takes revenge on the king of Thebes, the king is torn apart at the hands of his mother. Jesus, in Holy Scripture, suffers at the hands of sinners, so that we do not have to fear God's revenge or suffer eternally but can find life with Him.

Dionysus offered the lusts of the flesh, inviting his followers to self-indulgence. Jesus offers the fruits of the spirit, including self-control.

Dionysus gives men wine to ease their suffering, bring joy, and inspire divine madness. Jesus gives us true drink in His blood, given in the cup for you, for the forgiveness of sins. Now we can live eternally with Him in heaven where there is no suffering and eternal joy in His divine presence.

Dionysus strikes fear in those who refuse to worship him. Jesus shows the steadfast love of the Father who welcomes all repentant sinners with open arms.

We shouldn't worry about the blue man dressing up like a Greek god. Despite his enduring popularity, Dionysus was and is no threat to Jesus. Regardless of what our world may consider to be meaningful art, Jesus is better by far.

I find the words of Confession work to keep me out of these ditches. The words are a reminder to those who are leaning toward the world that there are duties Christ asks of us that are incompatible with the world. "We have not loved our neighbors as ourselves, we have not loved you with our whole hearts'.

And the words of Confession are a condemnation of those whose focus is on the outward appearance, while fooling themselves that God doesn't know their thoughts and 'things done and not done'.

May we strive to maintain the balance in our Christian life that come from Confession and the Absolution that follows.
